She is a founding member, initiator, and president of De-a Arhitectura Association since 2013, the first Romanian team that develops and promotes architecture and built environment education for children and youth in schools. She is a delegate of the Romanian Order of



Architects at the International Union of Architects (UIA) for the Architecture and Children Work Programme, where she is co-director since 2023.

De-a Arhitectura is a community of built environment professionals and teachers shaping a better future through architecture education for children, youth, and adults. Programs foster creativity and innovation, and help children get ready for the real world. Educational programs take place mainly in schools in the form of optional courses, but also in museums and in architecture and design events. The mission is: both children and adults understand and cherish the values of the built environment and become active citizens in their local communities, built environment professionals get involved in society through education, play, experiments and creativity to foster education. The De-a Arhitectura Association was founded in January 2013 by a team of 6 and has since grown to include over 70 associate members, teachers, and professionals of the built environment. The cultural program "De-a arhitectura architecture and built environment education" was initiated in 2011, and since 2016 the Romanian Order of Architects (OAR) has decided that it should become a priority cultural program, because it meets the five criteria of priority cultural programs: scale, singularity, uniqueness, complexity and quality. Iza Rutkowska is a designer and founder of the Fundacja Form i Kształtów [Forms and Shapes Foundation] as well as Zoochitecture Studio, she also teaches at School of Form.

Rutkowska conducts performative research related to space and its users. The example of her activities could be the playground in the shape of a 120-metre-long snake that she created with children in Madrid. For five years she has been leading the re-shaping of the Backyard of All Neighbours in Wrocław, initiated by a 7-metre-long hedgehog which landed in the very backyard. She designs interactive objects in order to catalyse the energy of a given community, and then cooperates with them with the aim of the permanent transformation of spaces. She cocreates playgrounds with children, and backyards with residents. She specialises in education as a process, by getting interdisciplinary groups of students involved in field activities. Later they implement independent projects related to the experience acquired during these activities. She conducts educational events and classes for numerous non-governmental organizations and community centres. She collaborates with municipal governments and art institutions in Poland and abroad. 2. arc en rêve centre d'architecture

speaker: Sara Meunier, architect, head of the educational department of arc en rêve topic: "A sensitive approach to space - arc en rêve activities for children & teenagers" Founded in Bordeaux in 1981, arc en rêve centre d'architecture promotes cultural awareness in the fields of architecture, urban planning, and landscape design, and plays a mediating role in promoting a high-quality living environment. Their children's and teenager's programs are based on developing a sensitive approach to space and on helping learners discover architectural design via contemporary architecture, involving major projects and/or less high-profile projects of outstanding quality. The overriding strategy is to learn from living spaces with an emphasis on sensitivity: feeling, emotions, perception, reception, and appreciation.

The presentation will show projects set up last year in five secondary schools to propose a reflection with pupils on their learning spaces. The projects, built over the course of a school year, brought together a class and an architect, an artist or an invited collective. The transversal pedagogy and the multidisciplinary nature of the approaches allowed the students to reappropriate the architecture of the living and learning spaces that they frequent on a daily basis: they took a fresh look at their classrooms, questioned the school spaces in order to redesign them, and questioned the relationship between the body and the teaching device.

The Centre's Pompidou building designed by architects Renzo Piano and Richard Rogers is particularly innovative and disruptive.



Inaugurated in 1977, it reflects the innovative character of the institution through a number of architectural breaks.

The museum's educational contents department has designed a complete range of mediation tools and activities or guided tours to help all audiences discover the key and innovative elements of this architecture. Beyond its collection, how can a museum building become an object of education and mediation for all audiences? How can the inside – outside, the architecture of a museum building and its environment be brought into dialogue?

Interdisciplinary postgraduate Archi:Culture. topic: Architecture. Workshops for Ukrainian children

The presentation is the result of more than a year and a half of workshops conducted for children from Ukraine. Architecture was the starting point for facing the difficult experiences the children encountered during the war. Creating models, creating new buildings on a small scale, was meant to help them believe that any city can be rebuilt, but you need architects their ideas and mock-ups - to do it. The children regained a sense of agency, and the form of meetings based on creation and play encouraged conversations about past experiences, which also had a therapeutic function.

10. STUDIO Ładne Halo / Golden Cubes Awards – a laureate of Polish section in the category Written media

speaker: Joanna Guszta. Children's book author. Co-founder of publishing house and graphic design studio Ładne Halo. topic: *Illustration, humour, imagination and*

creativity in a series of picture books for architectural education: 'City Monster', 'Here and Now', 'Not Just Playgrounds'.

The series of picture books designed by Joanna Guszta and created in duo with illustrator Przemek Liput. They were created as a starting point for discussions with children about serious issues as:

the basics of aesthetics, quality space and a sense of community ('City Monster') environmental solutions and climate resilience of the city ('Here and Now') urban infrastructure for children, which can be great for developing creativity, empathy, valuable attitudes, citizenship, or care for the environment not only

among children but among all residents ('Not Just Playgrounds').

The books were created with attention to the needs of the target group. They usesimple language, humour and imaginative stories in parallel in the texts and illustrations, so that they complement each other. Since they were also created as an educational tool, they are complemented by call to action challenges and one free workshop scenario available online.

11. Special School Number 2 in Gdańsk speaker: Katarzyna Szpernalowska, teacher

speaker: Katarzyna Szpernalowska, teacher, educator

topic: "Educational project on the zigzag trail" – Special School No. 2 in Gdańsk

The presentation is a reportage from an art education project. Due to the change of the school's headquarters, there was a need to "familiarize" the new place. The school is surrounded by a modernist housing estate from the 1960s. The leitmotif of this architecture is zigzag, which is repeated in the structures and details of the buildings. This ancient symbol of water became the code of the place. Students learned to look at architecture carefully and consciously. The project inspired them to pursue individual explorations, gave them the satisfaction of noticing further details and reproducing them in individual photographic and artistic projects.

speaker: Natalia Gaweł, architect, educator topic: Urban dentist - urban game for children Natalia Gaweł (from Gdańsk, Poland) - an architect by profession, an educator by passion. In 2020 finished the postgraduate study programme ArchiCulture: Architecture Educator. The final project of her studies was an urban game for children called Urban Dentist. Her short presentation will show how to develop childhood ideas into urban scale and help to solve ongoing issues. Urban Dentist is a method based on workshops targeted to local communities. The participants study and explore a chosen area, researching a space which they find important but undervalued. The study determines needs and desires of the community and the idea of how the space can be improved and become useful to them. The importance of sustainable growth and how the space affects its residents is also acknowledged.

14. PLACES Foundation

speaker: Magdalena Storożenko-Polak, architect, educator, and accessibility advocate. President of the Places Foundation responsible for UNIfest. festival of universal design. topic: Empathy – How to teach about universal design and accessibility.

How do we educate about accessibility to shape an empathetic society?

This presentation explores the impact of educational workshops in fostering empathy through accessibility awareness. We will share our experiences using a newly developed tool and workshop scenarios designed to engage children, youth, and adults on the importance of universal design and accessibility.

Do empathizing workshops work well with children? How to prepare exercises to teach universal design to the youngest?

The proposed presentation will share our thoughts and results after those architectural workshops.

15. Saint-Gobain Poland – sponsor of the Forum

speakers: Henryk Kwapisz – director of institutional relations at Saint-Gobain Polska Kornelia Rozwadowska – owner of Betonika topic: The examples of effective cooperation between corporation and youth aiming on broadening the knowledge on architecture. The Architecture Student Contest is an international competition based on Saint-Gobain's vision of sustainable buildings. It was first organized in 2004 by Saint-Gobain Isover in Serbia, and Warsaw hosted students in 2022. Today, it attracts more than 1,300 students in 30 countries. In 2023 Saint-Gobain Poland co-

organized a hackathon to find the best tools to promote sustainable cities. The winners presented an internet game for children. The aim of the game is to change the city from unfriendly to friendly for citizens.

Workshop – discussion in the World Café format

The World Cafe is a method which makes use of an informal cafe setting for participants to explore an issue by discussing it in small table groups. Discussion is held in multiple rounds of 20-30 minutes, with the cafe ambiance intended to allow for more relaxed and open conversations to take place.

During the World Cafe workshop participants can change tables to find the most interesting subject for themselves. At the end of the workshop, they need to choose one topic that they would like to deepen. This way, all the participants will split into 5 working groups.

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The next day they will work in groups on the topics from the World Cafe workshop, designing tools prototypes for each theme.

Table groups:

1."Architherapy" – Built Environment Education (BEE) in challenging contexts

facilitator: Natalia Gaweł

How to use built environment education while working with children or adults in challenging life situations (e.g. war, migration, social exclusion, etc.).

Can you imagine how it feels when your own life is at risk, or you feel excluded from society? Maybe you want to find a safe space, somewhere to hide. In this table we will discuss challenging life situations, how to address them via Built Environment Education and make choices for the better future. What does architherapy mean for you? Do you think education and architecture can be used to help solve societal issues? I invite everyone interested to open discussion.

2. Climate change and Built Environment Education (BEE)

What are the best ways to link the built environment education with ecological one? How to make our educational activities sustainable?

How can children and adults become active participants of the cities or architecture creation process?

Can we involve children in the designing process? Should architects designing spaces ask kids about their needs? By engaging children and young people in designing and planning the built environment we can create cities, towns, buildings, neighborhoods, and communities.

5. Building/Museum as an educational tool facilitators: Peggy Derder (Centre Pompidou) and Hanna Zwierzchowska (Museum of modern art in Warsaw)

A simple plan of a building can be extended from a basic shelter to an adventure story about people's lives.

The spaces we are creating and using also creates us. We are used to learning in rooms, but can we also learn from them? How can we use a building as a tool in education?
